by Barbara Henderson

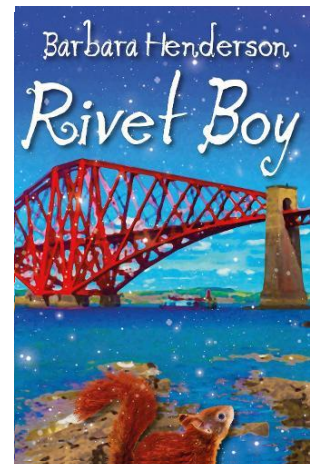
Recommended by: Lindsay Littleson, author of 'The Titanic Detective Agency'

by Ally Sherrick

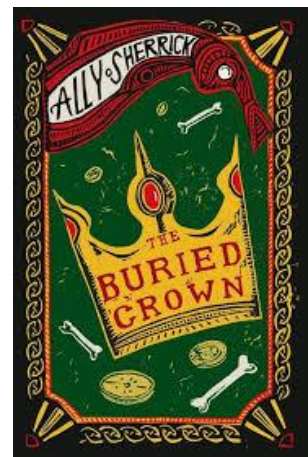

A Different Kind of Freedom: A Romani Story

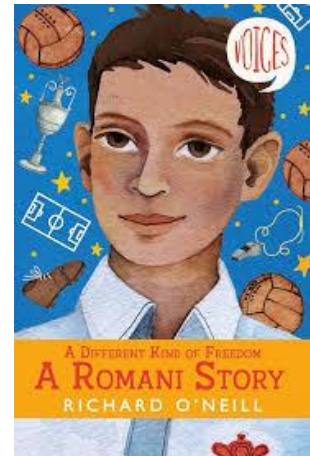

The Diary of a Young Girl

Recommended by: Joseph Lamb, author of 'The God of All Small Boys' and Tom Palmer, author of 'Resist'

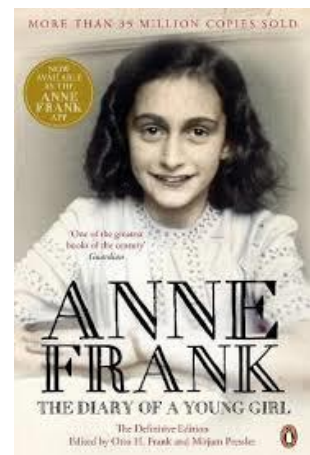
Summary: In 1942, with the Nazis occupying Holland, a thirteen-year-old Jewish girl and her family fled their home in Amsterdam and went into hiding.

For the next two years, until their whereabouts were betrayed to the Gestapo, the Franks and another family lived cloistered in the "Secret Annexe" of an old office building. Cut off from the outside world, they faced hunger, boredom, the constant cruelties of living in confined quarters, and the ever-present threat of discovery and death.

In her diary, Anne Frank recorded vivid impressions of her experiences during this period.

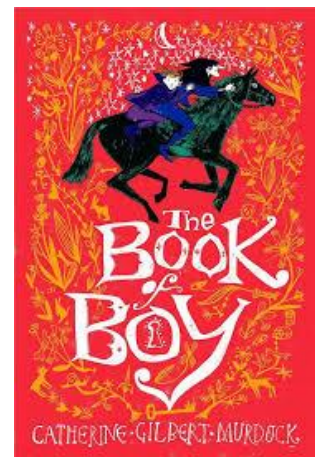
The Book of Boy

Secundus is a man on a mission, and upon first sight of Boy, enlists him as his servant, ripping him away from tranquility and plunging them both into a perilous medieval treasure hunt ... but there is more to the pilgrim's quest than meets the eye.



Queen of Freedom

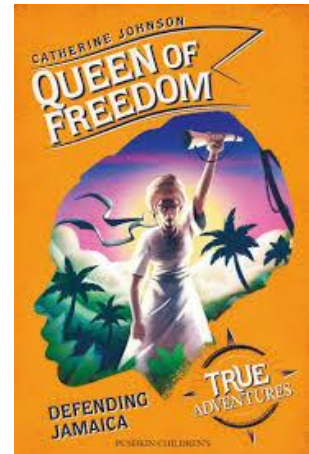

Summary: Set in Jamaica in the 1720s, this is the incredible true story of Queen Nanny, leader of the Maroons, a community of escaped slaves who have settled high up in the Blue Mountains. The Maroons are hunted by British soldiers, known as redcoats, and are either killed or returned to a brutal life of slavery.

Nanny is a courageous guerrilla fighter, with a skill for strategic thinking and tactical fighting, who does everything she can to protect the freedom of the Maroons. Her reputation for Obeah magic, a spiritual system of belief and healing from her homeland, enables her to spread rumours of dark magic, which terrifies the redcoats and helps to keep them at bay.

The Swallows' Flight

Summary: Erik and Hans are German boys. Ruby and Kate are English girls. They grow up in worlds that would never meet, until war tumbles their lives together.

Jeannie says: "It just really stayed in my head."



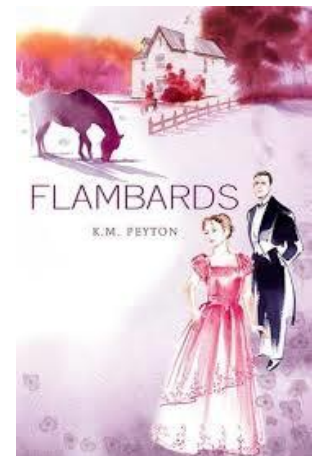
Flambards

Barbara says: "The book that got me into historical fiction."



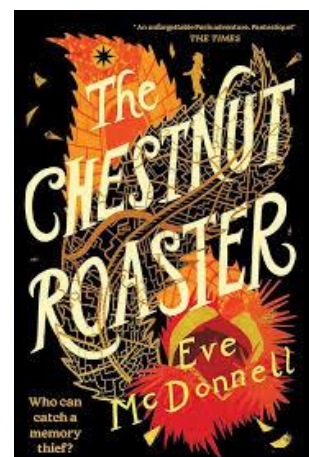
The Chestnut Roaster

The Diamond of Drury Lane

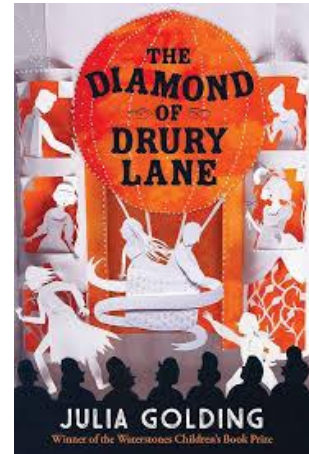

The Little Match Girl Strikes Back

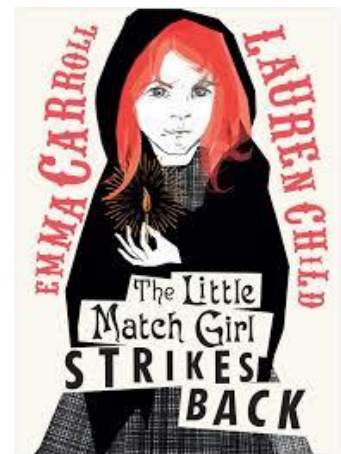

Eve says: "I love a good mashup of history and magic, and this book does exactly that."

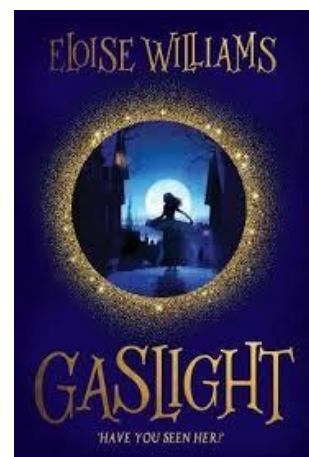


Gaslight

Coram Boy

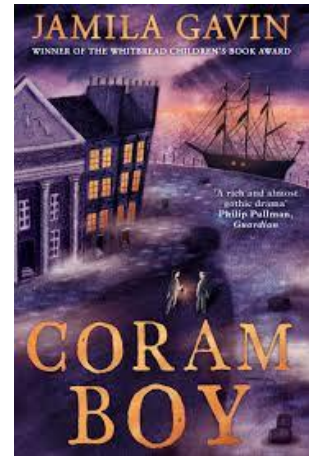

A Nest of Vipers

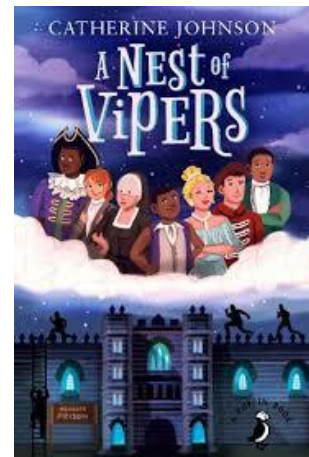
